




Focus of CiE

Research

Qualitative or quantitative research paper

- Qualitative and quantitative research, focusing on the conditions and activities that can foster education in children and young people living with a acute or chronic illness or facing other disruption in their lives.
- Reporting on evidence that schools can and do make a difference to personal and interpersonal outcomes, within and beyond learning attainments.
- Researches are based on evidences and follow the experimental method.



Research

Typical research paper structure

Title and Abstract;

- Introduction (including background with some Literature Review on the subject and a clear formulation of hypothesis or research questions);
- Methods;
- Results;
- Discussion;
- Conclusion (including limits of the study and suggestions for further research);
- References.

Practice and intervention

Activities aimed at improving education, health and development

- Empower children with a medical condition.
- Maintain or facilitate their reintegration into everyday life.
- Individual, classroom-based or community level.
- This type of article is centered on an activity.
- It is <u>not</u> "telling what you have done", it is showing others how they can redo/adapt your activity in their context.

Practice and intervention

Activities aimed at improving education, health and development

- Share the activity with other colleagues around the word, and give them all the necessary information to adapt it to their context and replicate it.
- A proper practice or intervention article should always include some kind of **evaluation** of the presented activities.

Table 4 The GREET checklist 2016^a

BRIEF NAME

- INTERVENTION: Provide a brief description of the educational intervention for all groups involved [e.g. control and comparator(s)]
- WHY this educational process
- THEORY: Describe the educational theory (ies), concept or approach used in the intervention.
- LEARNING OBJECTIVES: Describe the learning objectives for all groups involved in the educational intervention.
- EBP CONTENT: List the foundation steps of EBP (ask, acquire, appraise, apply, assess) included in the educational intervention.

WHAT

- MATERIALS: Describe the specific educational materials used in the educational intervention. Include materials provided to the learners and those used in the training of educational intervention providers
- EDUCATIONAL STRATEGIES: Describe the teaching/learning strategies (e.g. tutorials, lectures, online modules) used in the educational intervention.
- INCENTIVES: Describe any incentives or reimbursements provided to the learners.

WHO PROVIDED

 INSTRUCTORS: For each instructor(s) involved in the educational intervention describe their professional discipline, teaching experience/expertise. Include any specific training related to the educational intervention provided for the instructor(s).

HOW

 DELINERY: Describe the modes of delivery (e.g. face-to-face, internet or independent study package) of the educational intervention. Include whether the intervention was provided individually or in a group and the ratio of learners to instructors.

WHERE

 ENVIRONMENT: Describe the relevant physical learning spaces (e.g. conference, university lecture theatre, hospital ward, community) where the teaching/learning occurred.

WHEN and HOW MUCH

 SCHEDULE: Describe the scheduling of the educational intervention including the number of sessions, their frequency, timing and

Telling my stories

Life Stories, narratives, case studies, personal journals....

- Stories coming from patients, family members, medical practitioners, educators, schoolmates, siblings....
- Personal point of view (interviews, narratives, personal journals, reflections)...
- Presented in a way that can inform and improve the work of the professionals in the field.

Ethics and Consent

Different codes apply based on the context and type of article

For all types of Articles:

- Always ask consent:
 - To the parents (written)
 - To the subjects, even if minors (written or verbal)
- Always guarantee anonymity (unless the child would be placed at risk by not sharing information).
- Allow subjects to withdraw at anytime.

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If the research is clinical (that is, conducted in a therapeutic setting or aimed at therapeutic results), you may need the approval of an ethics committee.

For educational research or practice, it is a good habit to seek the approval of some local school board or committee.

You'll always need to declare what type of consent and approval you got for the work you are presenting.

- To support the sharing of good practice, ideas and activities internationally.




